Walkin' on the Moon: Letter from Congress

Dear Mr. Smith:

This letter is to notify you that we are planning to argue to the U.S. Congress that all future funding for your company's development of "lunar tourism" should be used for other, more important, areas of research. We believe that the very idea of traveling to the moon for vacation is not only absurd, but impossible. You have argued that the famous "moon landing" of 1969 is proof that people can one day travel to and explore the surface of the moon. In fact, we believe that the moon walk never happened, and that it was staged using actors and special effects. Here is why:

- The gravitational pull of the earth is too strong for a large spaceship to fly far away; any ship large enough for many people would be able to orbit the earth, not pull away completely.
